Founded in 1473...

St Catharine's College was founded in 1473 by Robert Woodlark. He had spent nearly twenty years buying up tenements in what is now Queens' Lane until he had a site large enough to accommodate the little hall which he called 'Saynt Kateryns Hall of Cambridge'. Two years later, on 16 August 1475, the hall was incorporated, by charter of King Edward IV, as a college for a Master and three or more Fellows: "a perpetual college _ for ever to remain".

Undergraduates were not admitted to St Catharine's until the 16th century, and at the beginning of the 17th century, it was still one of the smallest Colleges in Cambridge. However, a series of outstanding Masters and generous benefactors were to change its fortunes.

In 1626 Dr John Gostlin bequeathed the Bull Inn to St Catharine's. The College used the revenue from the Inn to found six new scholarships

and to build a new building on Queens' Lane. This was followed in 1704 by the completion of the new College Chapel. The bequest of Mary Ramsden when she died in 1745 enabled the building of A and B staircases, and led to the College changing its orientation from Queens' Lane to Trumpington Street.

The 19th century brought two Masters of exceptional quality: Joseph Proctor (Master from 1799-1845) and Henry Philpott (Master from 1845-1861). Philpott was Bursar prior to becoming Master, and went on to become Bishop of Worcester. While he was Master, the College was honoured with a visit by Queen

Victoria and Prince Albert, who was also Chancellor of the University. The Queen and Price Albert attended a dinner in what is now the SCR and the Duke of Wellington, who was also in the Royal Party, was accommodated in what is now the Old Lodge.

The latter part of the 19th century was dominated by what became known as the 'Robinson Vote'. In 1861 the election for Philpott's successor took place, with Charles Robinson and Francis Jameson standing for the position. The actual facts of the case are obscure, but Jameson voted for Robinson, presumably expecting Robinson to vote for him, but Robinson voted himself, enabling him to win. The episode was well-known throughout the causing the reputation of the College to suffer for a number of years.

It was not until after World War I that the fortunes of the College rose again. An influx of undergraduate ex-servicemen led to a period of growth for the College under the Masterships of Bishop Drury and Frederick Rushmore. The Fellowship began to expand also. Work to increase student accommodation began with the completion of Hobson's in 1930 and continued with the John's Building in 1935.

In 1966 a major rebuilding project took place under the Mastership of Professor E. E. Rich, creating a new larger hall, new kitchens and the accommodation between St Catharine's and King's College. Pressure on accommodation continued to grow, and in 1981 further accommodation was built at St. Chad's on Grange Road, with further rooms added in 1998. In 2013 the College completed the building of a new lecture theatre, College bar and JCR in Chapel Court. Named the McGrath Centre, the new building has greatly enhanced the College's

Did you know...

St Catharine's has the only open-sided court, visible from the street, of any Cambridge College.

John Addenbrooke, who gave his name to Cambridge's hospital, was a Fellow. We still have his books, specimens and body.

The two lampposts in front of the College have bases made out of French cannons captured at Waterloo.

St Catharine's is the College of Sir Ian McKellen, known for his roles as Gandalf, Magneto and King Lear.

Other famous Alumni include Jeremy Paxman, Sir Peter Hall, Rebecca Hall, Ben Miller, Richard Ayoade and Tunku Abdul Rahmun.

The famous phrase 'Hobson's choice' originated with Thomas Hobson (1544–1631), who owned a livery stable where the Hobsons building now stands. Customers were offered the choice of either taking the horse in his stall nearest to the door or taking none at all.

As first point of contact within the College, the Lodge is staffed 24 hours a day. Places of interest



Kings College Chapel - Stunning and iconic. It is famed for its choral services, in particular the evensong services and the Christmas Eve service.

Fitzwilliam Museum - World-renowned collections include antiquities, applied arts, illuminated manuscripts, and paintings by Constable, Hogarth, and Gainsborough.

The Corpus Clock – A sculpture of a beastly time eating insect, the 'Chronophage', sits atop the gold handless clock with LED lights. Both beautiful and disturbing.



Cambridge University Botanic Gardens - a beautiful heritage-listed garden originally concieved by Professor John Henslow, the mentor and teacher of Charles Darwin.

Scudamores Punting - Cambridge punt hire, perfect for trips along the College Backs or out towards Grantchester. Guided and Self-hire available.



The Eagle Pub - Drinking and thinking hub where Watson and Crick announced they had discovered 'the secret of life'. Traditional British pub fare.

Pint Shop - Creative menus, craft beers, real ales and a wonderful gin collection. Industrial-chic décor in a Grade II listed building. Modern British cuisine.

The Mill - One of Cambridge's most iconic pubs, a 19th Century Mill idyllically located on the grassy banks of the River Cam overlooking Laundress Green



Fitzbillies - A Cambridge institution. Its famously sticky chelsea buns have been made and sold on the premises since 1921.

Aromi – Artisan Sicilian bakery and café serving excellent food using their revered 'pizzaioli' (pizza-makers) to produce authentic handmade food worth waiting for.

Michaelhouse Café - serving delicious fresh handmade food cooked on site every day. This café, situated within St Michaels church, has the aim 'to make simple things perfectly'.



Bread & Meat - Independent eatery specialising in roast meat sandwiches, craft beers and coffee. Honest, excellent food.

Cambridge Chop House – the restaurant serves up traditional, no nonsense British food with a speciality in steaks. The real ales are local and served from the cask, while the wine list is imaginative. St Johns Chop house is the sister restaurant following the same ethos.

Trinity restaurant - their mission is simple 'To deliver a great fresh plate of food, served by friendly, knowledgeable staff in a warm and inviting atmosphere.' Sister to the Varsity restaurant.
